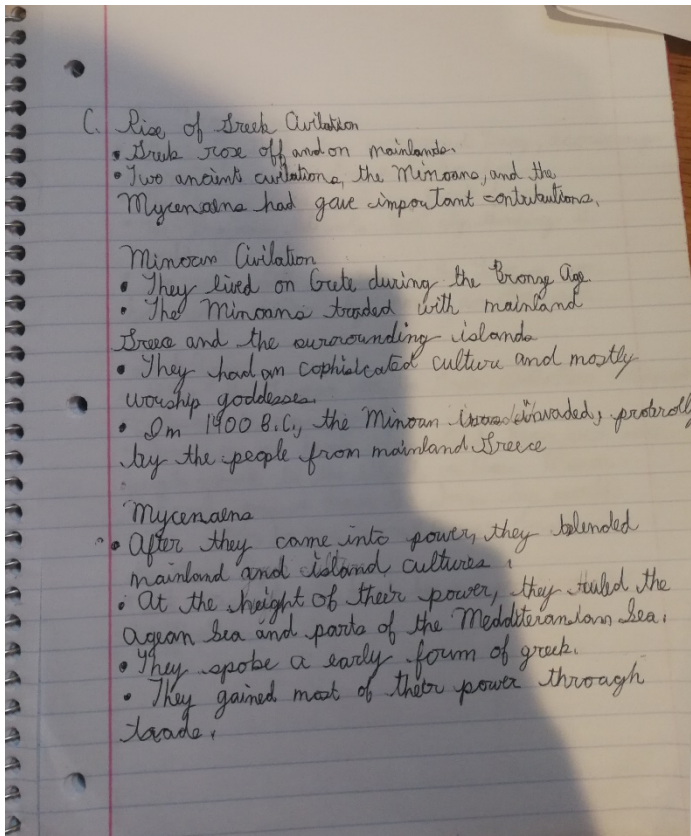

Archimedes : a Greek inventor and mathematician who was the first to say the word revolves around the Sun

Aristotle : a Greek philosopher who became a student of Plato and became a famous teacher; wrote about and taught everything

Troy : an ancient city in northwestern Anatolia, the Asian part of Turkey; the Trojan War

Macedonia : ancient kingdom on the Balkan peninsula in southeastern Europe; the site of the present-day Macedonian empire

**Facts about Greek Science:**


- Thales thought that everything was made up of water.
- Democritus thought everything was made up of tiny little things called atoms - which was found to be true from scientists later on.

**Sophists would argue and debate in public about philosophies, science, etc.**

- The Greeks developed a device that calculated the movement of planets.
- The Greeks made a screw called the Archimedes screw which could carry water to a higher place by turning it.

**Outside the textbook facts:**

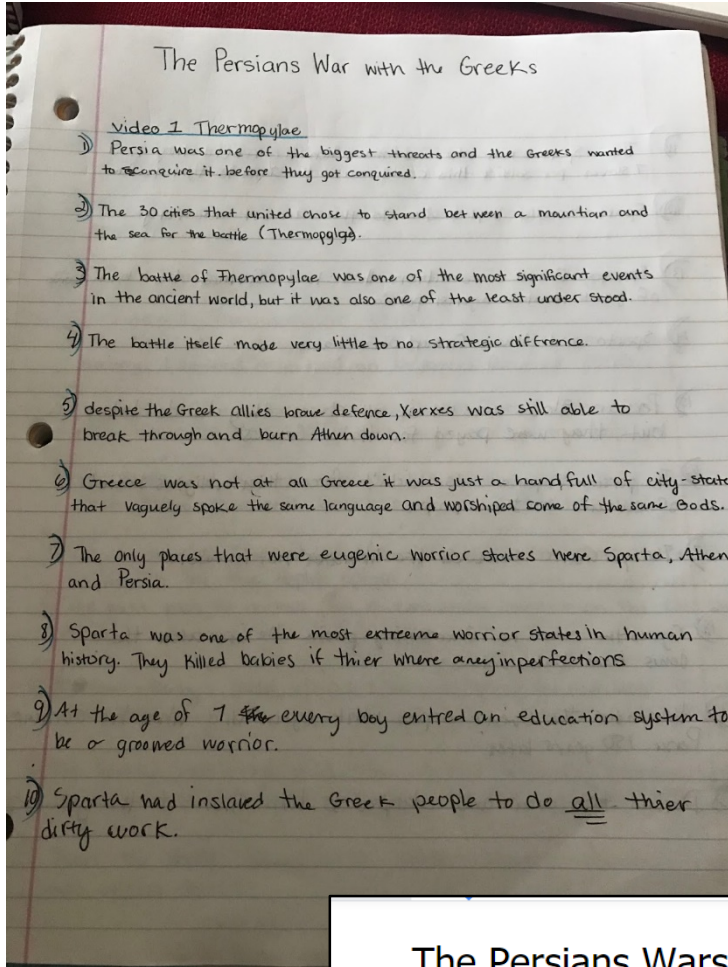
- Fun fact: The Greeks invented the alarm clock and the water wheel in the 3rd Century b.c.
- Some physicians in Ancient Greece performed experiments on humans and animals. Galen, for instance, experimented on the functions of organs.
- Aristotle was actually the first person to introduce the idea of earth being a "globe" type shape.

Minute 1	-Greek city-states come together to try and defeat Persia -They choose to battle in Thermopylae -Xerxes burned Athens -Thermopylae shaped how Greece thought of itself
Minute 2	-Sparta was one of the most extreme societies in history: -if a baby had imperfections they would kill it -every seven year old boy would start school and learn how to be a warrior
Minute 3	-Sparta had a massive group of slaves called the Helots -helots did all of the labor work -Spartan people kept the Helots in terror so that they wouldn't rise up against the Spartans -They would murder the Helots who wanted to rise up against the Spartans
Minute 4	-Sparta formed a pact with neighboring city-states -Sparta and Athens did not come together and they were threats to each other -King Leonidas was Sparta's representative
Minute 5	-Athens was the total opposite of Sparta -They said citizens first and soldiers second -they developed a democratic society -Themistocles persuaded the society to use money that they found and form a navy instead of splitting it amongst themselves -Themistocles represented Athens at Corinth

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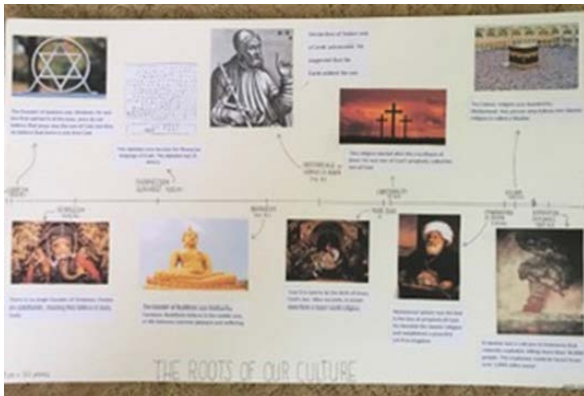
